Any Christian formation program is only as strong as its teachers and we are very fortunate to have a very strong group of volunteers this year. Children are offered the chance to attend their own worship services during the 9 a.m. Sunday service led by dedicated and talented adults. I would like to especially thank Carrie Farris for stepping into Kris Cannata's very big shoes and taking over the leadership of Children's Chapel. Kris is staying on as one of the leaders and is joined by Jennifer Duncan and Toni Cobb.

Sacred Spaces, our chapel for 2nd- 5th graders is led again by Larry Domenico, Tim Kelly, and me. This is an opportunity to connect with these children who are in their middle years and still very impressionable. Larry, Tim and I receive much inspiration from the time we spend there discussing the Gospel.

In November Carrie Farris led the entire congregation in a very original and fun rendition of the story of Joshua and Jericho. We hope for some more of this type of offering in the spring.

Our Sunday school leadership is stronger than ever before with over thirty men and women working in the classrooms. In order to save funds we are recycling some previous stories and therefore not purchasing new curriculum this year. So far we have studied Joseph, Esther, Bible Basics, Creation & Stewardship, and Jesus' Birth. Beginning in January we will be working with Holy Baptism, Mary & Martha, The Twelve who Changed the World, The Parables, Holy Week and some time devoted to learning more about St. Martin in the Fields Church.

The fifth grade Sunday school class under the leadership of Toni Cobb has been on fire, raising money for Paws and doing some very creative classes including their Bible Quiz game. Thank you, Ian Street!

Charlotte Smith continues to run our nursery and provide the very highest standard of loving care for our babies and toddlers. St. Margaret's Guild deserves a big thank you for staffing our nursery and helping to keep it clean and safe.

This past summer Allison Henderson and Amanda Schab led almost 100 children in a meaningful, fun-filled four days of VBS. And we were fortunate to have dozens of teen volunteers! In 2010 we are lucky enough to have Jill Elliot and Holly Green already on board to do the same.

This spring we are looking forward to a bigger and better Easter Egg Hunt complete with lunch with the Easter Bunny.

Sunday mornings are always a bit hectic and my "assistant" Mary Evelyn Beeland is invaluable to folks who can't find whatever it is they need, so thank you Mary Evelyn!

We are blessed to have four fabulous youth leaders for our 6th and 7th graders this year. They are Ben & Cindy Jernigan and Brad & Emily Glahn. They are leading a group of 32 young people through the first stage of our Journey to Adulthood program. We will have four Rite 13 Liturgies (special services) in our church over the next two years and experienced the first of these in November. Nine young people who are 13 years of age participated along with their parents in the Episcopal Church's rite of passage. All witnesses declared it a moving experience and promised to aid these young men and women in their spiritual journey as they progress to adulthood. In addition to Sunday school classes on Sunday morning the Rite 13 members participate in EYC events with other youth. I think we all agree that it does in fact, take a village to raise children successfully and St. Martin's is committed to being a God centered village for these teens. Thank you especially to the Jernigans, Glahn's, Tarantino's and the clergy for all their help.

As we end another year at this blessed church, my prayer is for all our children to feel at home here, to know that God loves and forgives them no matter what, and that Christ wants them to pass that enormous love on to everyone they encounter.

# Music at St. Martin's

The return of two sung services on Sunday mornings has allowed the handbell and children's choirs to add services to their monthly rota. The choir schedule is as follows:

Week 1: Children and Adult choirs at 9:00; Vocal quartet at 11:15

Week 2: Children and Adult choirs at 9:00; Handbell Choir at 11:15

Week 3: Handbell Choir at 9:00; Vocal quartet at 11:15

Week 4: Adult Choir at 9:00; Vocal quartet at 11:15

Week 5: Adult Choir at 9:00; Vocal quartet at 11:15

Thanks to the generosity of the many people who contributed to our Friends of Music fund, we were able to continue our musical programs uninterrupted. The current budget situation required some cuts to the music budget, and our Fund enabled us to keep our paid section leaders, provide an orchestra for the 6:00 p.m. service on Christmas Eve, and to have special instrumental music at several Sunday morning services. We also hosted a piano recital for the Pro-Mozart Society in 2009.

Although we were unable to have a choir concert in 2008, we did have extra choral and instrumental music at our All Saints Sunday service. Our choir concerts will resume in 2010. Also in 2010 St. Martin in the Fields Church will be hosting four concerts for the Pro-Mozart Society.

St. Martin's Church offers a variety of musical experiences for people of all ages. The Chancel Choir (Eighth grade through any adult age) rehearses each Thursday evening from 6:00 to 7:30. They present a concert each spring or fall that always includes a major work for chorus and orchestra. Their repertoire includes Bach cantatas, oratorios by Handel and various Masses. The choir also participates in a Diocesan confirmation and ordination services and concerts.

Thanks to the expertise and equipment of Leonard Young, the choirs are now producing and recording CDs of concerts and special events.

The choir has social activities during the year and provides wonderful fellowship and opportunities for Christian service. The Handbell Choir (Eighth grade through any adult age) is directed by Martha Fowler and it rehearses on Wednesday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00. This is a committed and loyal group. Members are continually challenged with music that broadens their musical horizons, and they meet the challenge with great enthusiasm. There is room for more ringers as regular members or substitutes.

The St. Nicholas Choir (age five through first grade) rehearses each Wednesday afternoon at 3:30, and the St. Cecilia Choir (second through seventh grades) rehearses each Wednesday afternoon at 4:15. St. Cecilia also sings with the Chancel Choir, enabling the young singers to gain valuable singing experiences with the adults. Each year both children's choirs present a Christmas Pageant (Christmas Eve at 3:00 p.m.) and a spring concert.

The St. Martin's Chamber Ensemble is a group of enthusiastic instrumentalists who want an opportunity to play in a small orchestra. The ensemble has played throughout the year at various Sunday services, weddings, Christmas Eve and Easter. The ensemble is open to anyone with an interest in participating. # Communications and St. Martin's

## JASON CLAY, ADMINISTRATOR OF COMMUNICATIONS

The longer I work at St. Martin's Church, the more I am stunned by all of the activities and outreach opportunities this church offers. Just when I believe I have learned everything there is to know, another layer of God's work in this place is revealed to me.

This year, I tried to capture a comprehensive picture of just what this church does, and I am nearly overwhelmed (in a good way) by all you do. I am proud to be a part of the staff at this church because, though I am not a member actively participating in your ministries, I feel as though I am doing my part to support all you do.

This year I maintained the well-established communications outlets St. Martin's has had for years (*The Parish Post* and *Weekly Welcome*), while improving upon some areas that needed attention, such as the website and e-mail communications. I have also worked to bridge these outlets together to create a seamless, interconnected set of reliable communication tools.

### Website

Last May I completely redesigned the website both graphically and in structure. The stained glass theme reflects the beautiful physical appearance of the church, and the new site structure makes navigating easy and updating a snap as compared to our old system. I also added some statistical tracking software, to evaluate how the website is used and so that I may further improve upon weak areas. Since the fall, we have had 6,000 visits, with the average time visitors spend on the website clocking in at two minutes and eighteen seconds.

### E-mail

I have made some subtle changes to the format of the weekly e-mail to direct readers to the website for lengthy information. This permits me to include shorter blurbs about more activities and programs without overwhelming readers with long passages of text. The readership of our e-mails has increased by about 50 since I began working here. Around 240 people regularly read our e-mails for late-breaking news.

### Online Transition

The rising cost of postage and materials is an industry-wide problem in the communications field, and it is no exception at St. Martin's. To cut costs (with the added perk of reducing waste going into our environment), I sought to transition readers from a paper copy of *The Parish Post* to an online version. My goal at the beginning of the school year was to have 33% of readers switch. To date 110 readers have switched, an almost 15% reduction, so we still have a ways to go to reach that goal. I hope that we will achieve it by the end of the school year.

### The Evaluation Process and You!

# GENERAL CONVENTION 2009

*Ubuntu*

*I in You and You in Me*

**REPORT SUBMITTED BY ANGELA WILLIAMSON, ST. MARTIN'S MEMBER SINCE 1975, GENERAL CONVENTION PARTICIPANT SINCE 2000**

"There will be no outcasts in this church," The Most Rev. Edmund Browning stated at the time of his election as Presiding Bishop in 1985. All who believe in the Gospel message, hopefully, would agree.

General Convention 2009 sought to assure a place for all of us through its prayerful plenary sessions, worship, and networking opportunities. Press reports, unfortunately, did not adequately report the many good things that were done and, in my opinion, disproportionately reported and distorted a few actions of the legislative body of our Episcopal Church.

The theme, *Ubuntu*, was woven throughout the convention. With the passage of legislation enabling full communion with the Moravians, the new round of bilateral dialogues with the Presbyterians, and the major agreed statement on interfaith relations, significant ecumenical progress was made.

The new medical trust will enable a larger pool of participants and, therefore, should lower medical insurance rates. Qualifying lay church employees can now participate in the Church Pension Fund. The revision of Title IV of our canons sets in place a better method for handling those rare, but unfortunate, times when clerical discipline is required.

There were two significant liturgical pieces approved to broaden our pastoral work and worship. *Rachael's Tears, Hannah's Hopes: Liturgies and Prayers for Healing from Loss Related to Childbearing and Childbirth* and *Holy Women, Holy Men: Celebrating the Saints*, "Guidelines and Procedures for Continuing Alteration of the Calendar of the Episcopal Church", which is a more diverse and ecumenical calendar, were approved.

"Commitment and Witness to Anglican Communion", a resolution based on a canon passed at General Convention 1993 stating that the ordination process is open to all, passed. It does not affect the rigorous ordination processes that all seeking ordination must go through in most dioceses.

Every Sunday we say the creed and in it are the words "...made in the image of God...". My prayer is that all of us live our lives respecting one another and working to spread the Gospel through our actions and respect for all people, all made in the image of God.

General Convention meets triennially. It is the legislative body of the Episcopal Church. Between conventions the Episcopal Church's Executive Council implements legislation and administrates just as the Diocese of Atlanta's Executive Council does between Annual Councils.

The 40 Days of Celebration, chaired by Elizabeth Beck and Judi Oakley and orchestrated by, participated in, and attended by huge numbers, provided over 5,000 cans to Emmaus House and \$25,000

for our many outreach efforts.

Children's Christian Formation provided wonderful Sunday School classes, chapels, Bible School, and made one Sunday service in October a rousing success as the walls came tumbling down. Our teens completed another successful year on the path to YAC status. The pilgrimage brought cohesiveness still evident today with commitment to giving back to the parish. They joined us all in saying a bitter-sweet goodbye to Fr. Skutch. The young adults of our parish are strengthening their relationships, their numbers, and their volunteerism in all areas. And the adults have been treated to engaging classes on Sundays, during Lent, and throughout the week, to new small groups, and to many social activities while giving back to the church and the community daily.

September brought the beginning of a year-long celebration of the 50th anniversary of St. Martin's School. Take time to view the "living history" exhibit in the school's lobby. It will bring back to many of you lots of memories of this, the church's longest running outreach project. Congratulations to all...50 years of raising "our" children is worthy of a long celebration.

Although our aging facility is experiencing some maintenance challenges, your Junior Warden, Allen Hamilton, and his experienced group of handy men and women have repaired and remodeled and are continuing to find the best possible ways to maintain and enhance our church. After

many, many months of survey and study and reports, reports, reports, our HVAC system will, hopefully, soon be brought up to today's standards of efficiency. Many thanks to Rex Simms for starting the ball rolling and to Allen for persevering.

The primary goal of the Christian Formation Commission is to create a community of formation for all members of St. Martins.

Under the direction of Melinda Mischik, there is a fine team of teachers working with our young children. They have studied and learned throughout the year. Children's Chapel and Sacred Spaces meets weekly joining their parents at the Peace. The weeklong Bible School each summer continues the children's Christian growth. FRAN PEARSON, CHAIRPERSON

Following our long established tradition here at St. Martin's to "love our neighbor as ourselves", we have continued to reach out to serve others in many and varied ways. This includes personal involvement and financial assistance. We find "our neighbors" to be local, regional and international. Participation in this Outreach Ministry includes all of us - clergy, staff, ECW Chapters, lay ministers and individuals. We encourage every member and friend of St. Martin's to be an active participant in this Outreach Ministry.

In 2009, much work has been done by many people to bring into existence an Outreach Center, thereby giving St. Martin's an opportunity to once again serve our "neighbors" in a fuller and more complete way. In 2010, we anticipate opening this Outreach Center in the Chamblee area. In the beginning, it promises to house a thrift shop, and later we hope to expand this ministry to include other St. Martin's programs, such as Emergency Assistance and meeting areas for groups. We have invited other members of the Brookhaven Christian Ministries to join our efforts as well.

On the third Sunday of each month, we are involved in our Faithful Friends Ministry. A recipient is designated, and we provide financial assistance and/or personal involvement to this group.

Some of the recipients this year include those serving in the military in Iraq and Afghanistan, Hospital Art, Emergency Assistance, Holy Comforter Church, AMIS, Interfaith Outreach Home, Emmaus House and Habitat. All members of the congregation are invited to submit ideas to the outreach committee for future events.

Some of the various outreach projects led by our guilds and men's club include the Men's Turkey Fry benefiting Emmaus House; St. Margaret's military support, Holy Comforter and Emmaus House supply drives; St. Monica's snack bags for Emergency Assistance and dinners for Interfaith Outreach Home; St. Elizabeth's meals for Holy Comforter Church; St. Mary Magdalene's support for Women's Resource Center, the Convent of St. Helena, IOH, Emmaus House and Emergency Assistance.

In the spring of 2011, we plan to join efforts with churches in the Brookhaven Christian Ministries group for another Habitat Build. All of us at St. Martin's are encouraged to continue to minister in Christ's name to "our neighbor's" in need, joining forces with groups or on an individual basis.

## Worship Commission

In May, the Vestry held two open forums to listen to parishioner concerns and comments on the Sunday service schedule. After gathering this feedback, the Vestry held a special session, facilitated by Al Talley, on May 31 to consider changing the Sunday service schedule. After a thorough discussion and evaluation process, the Vestry voted to return to the "traditional" St. Martin's Sunday worship schedule in the fall. As a result, we now have Sunday services at 7:45 a.m., 9:00 a.m. and 11:15 a.m., with Sunday school between the two large services at 10:10 a.m. The 5:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday services and the Wednesday morning healing service

remained unchanged. After nearly four months, the new Sunday morning schedule seems to be working very well.

Another important worship development this year was the creation of the Service Planning Committee. This committee, consisting of representatives from each of the worship ministries: choir, vergers, ushers, altar guild, acolytes, eucharistic ministers and clergy meets at 8:30 a.m. every third Thursday to plan for the upcoming month and to ensure good communication between these ministries so things run smoothly at our services.

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## Parish Life Commission

The Parish Life Commission seeks to coordinate and promote various events that will bring the parish community together throughout the year.

The mission of the Parish life committee in 2009 was to have as many low- to no-cost events that appealed to the diverse population of our church. Highlights included, Soup for the Soul, the parish retreat at Kanuga (Peace, Love & Bingo), the Concert Near the Field, a night out at the Braves game and a bike ride / picnic on the Silver Comet Trail.

Our parish directory was also updated this year thanks to the organization and dedication of Carmen Hegwood, Ann Martin Vitti, Ruth Anne Tatum, Marcia Schwefler, Beth Edwards, Marilee Betor, Susan Hamilton and Kathryn Johnson.

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## Buildings and Grounds

The Buildings and Grounds committee continues the important work of updating the Heating and Air Conditioning system. Our HVAC systems are very old and inefficient. Indeed the boiler that heats the church sanctuary building is original equipment and has been operating since 1953.

Much work has been done on this project. An engineering study was completed in 2009, and system design has been done. One bid has been received and we hope to get two more bids soon.

We hope to make a new, energy efficient mechanical system a reality in 2010.

# St. Martin Stewardship Campaign for 2010

As the Stewardship Committee suspected earlier on in our pre-planning of the 2010 Campaign that this Campaign would not be an easy one. The economy and the view of 2010 were clearly weighing on the minds of our fellow parishioners.

Once again this year the Committee, in conjunction with the Finance Committee, wanted to begin the Campaign earlier in the year. We began meeting on September 2, 2009 to organize the Campaign with the assistance of the clergy. We looked to condense the Campaign into a six week time period, which would have ended on All Saints Day, Sunday, November 11. Trying to push the Campaign earlier into the year is vital for the budgeting process.

Additionally, we were seeing our number of pledges and subsequently our average pledge amount shrink, year-over-year. Therefore, we added suggested giving ranges in this year's Campaign along with a commitment of time and talent (God's spiritual gifts) to help shore up a reduction in pledge volume. The suggested giving amounts are as follows:

1. Percentage Giving: Make 10% the minimum and work to increase the goal annually (or)
2. The Fair Share: \$2,600/family (or)
3. Equal Sacrifice: \$1 of income each week for every \$1000 of annual income. As an example, a person earning \$10,000 a year would give \$10 per week or \$500 a year.

Our current per pledge average is \$2,305. Had the parish responded with an average per family of \$2,600 x 346 total pledges (to date) we would be \$102,000 closer to our goal. In future campaigns we must continue to push the per pledge average upward to \$2,600 to \$3,000.

As one can read from the Stewardship Report below (dated- 12-21-09) we are still over \$202,000 short of our goal of \$1 million. Further, when comparing year-over-year the total pledges for 2010 are short of the historical amounts by 33 pledges in 2009 and 106 pledges in 2008, respectively.

The Stewardship Committee would like to gratefully thank all of those families that arose to the occasion for the 2010 Campaign. If you have not prayerfully provided your pledge at this stage please do so.

# The Endowment Fund: 2009 Report to the Vestry and Parish

The Endowment Fund of St. Martin's Church (previously known as the "Trust Fund") was established in 1971 by a gift of \$100 from our rector at that time, the Reverend Dewey Gable.

The purpose of the Fund continues to be the same - to provide a trust fund for those wishing to make a lasting gift or leave a bequest to a fund separate from the operating funds of the church. Its objective is "to enable the church to fulfill more completely its mission through the development and enhancement of the church, its facilities and ministries beyond what is possible through annual operating funds."

The Fund is a true endowment trust, in that the principal, the sum of all gifts made to the fund, shall not be invaded. In other words, those who give to the fund can know that their gifts will last forever - the amount given is never spent, only the proceeds from the investments of the gift - such as interest, rents, and capital growth.

The funds available for annual distribution are 5% of the twelve quarter average of the earning assets of the Fund. We are pleased to report that every penny was put to good use last year, as follows in the chart below.

The Endowment Fund has ten trustees - currently Andy Beck, Joan Goodhew, Allen Hamilton, Bob Hamilton, Randy Hughes, Sid Oakley, Irmina Owens, Becky Short, Sandy Rose and George Williamson (Chairman) - that are elected for five year rotating terms by the remaining trustees, and confirmed by the vestry. No trustee may serve more than two full terms. The rector and senior warden serve as advisory, non-voting trustees. Minutes of the quarterly meetings and financial reports are available for review.

Gifts to the Fund are welcome at any time, including bequests via wills. The Fund is recognized by the IRS and gifts are tax-deductible. Several gifting methods exist which provide both tax advantages and current income during the donor's lifetime. Information is available from the church office, from the rector or the senior warden, or from any of the trustees. IT IS IMPORTANT THAT GIFTS TO THE FUND, ESPECIALLY THOSE MADE VIA A WILL, BE DESIGNATED SPECIFICALLY TO "THE ENDOWMENT FUND OF ST. MARTIN IN THE FIELDS EPISCOPAL CHURCH, ATLANTA, GEORGIA." Gifts simply designated to "St. Martin's Church" are used in the best interests of the parish as the vestry determines, and do not automatically go to the Fund.

The Fund also sponsors the Martin Dewey Gable Society, which recognizes persons who notify the rector that they have made bequest provisions to the

Fund. A brick display in the courtyard contains the names of the members of the society.

The financial report of the Fund follows. Any Trustee will be happy to discuss the operation of the Fund at any time.

# SERVICE AND SOCIAL ORGANIZATIONS

## Emergency Assistance Fund

Every Tuesday morning the Emergency Assistance Fund helps needy families in zip codes 30319 and 30341 with basic services. In 2009 we accepted donations of \$32,734.82, \$24,000 of which was from the Outreach budget. The rest was donations from various church organizations and individuals, many in honor or in memory of loved ones.

Our expenses were \$35,814.74, which was paid to over 709 families for their expenses. We helped about 179 families with electric bills, totaling \$11,311.13; 67 families with gas bills totaling \$3,336.91; 206 families with grocery bills totaling \$4,618.12; 5 families with medical bills totaling \$360.83; 169 families with rent, totaling

\$10,458.64; 7 families with telephone bills totaling \$359.16; 65 families with transportation, either gasoline for their cars or MARTA cards, totaling \$4,692.88; 11 families with water bills totaling \$676.07; and 5 families with miscellaneous bills totaling \$174.38.

Our wonderful and caring volunteer staff consists of about 17 people, who are very dedicated to providing all the assistance possible with sympathy and understanding. Others who would like to join us are welcome to come and spend a couple of hours on Tuesday morning.

3. Saturday, November 7 - Gala Celebration, Dessert Auction and Silent Auction
4. Sunday, November 8 - Grand Finale Brunch and Raffle

Our Gala Celebration was well attended. We had some old friends visit as well as some new friends. The rumors about the Presiding Bishop coming incognito have not been substantiated to date. However, we were beset by toga wearing, pizza toting partiers, attacked by pirates, shamed by working stiffes, and reminded how things used to be by a group of lava lamped, sofa sitting, 60's type hippies who looked strangely familiar. This past year has been very exciting for the start-up ministry, ChristCare. We finished training six leaders and worked very closely developing a program for the Lenten season. Since that time, three very successful small groups have formed. Sally Nail has a group of five women. They just finished *Calm My Anxious Heart* with an accompanying journal. Sally says that they "have enjoyed the scripture readings that remind us that God is in control and that by trusting and keeping in prayer, we can find peace of heart (or at least give it a good try!)" As their mission, the group chose to support a ministry begun by Sally Perez's sister that works with recently released incarcerated women who are trying to get their lives back together. They put together gift bags with needed items such as toiletries, stationery, hats, scarves, gloves and baked Christmas treats. The first Friday in January they will begin a six-week study entitled *Living Free* by Beth Moore. It is a Bible study which relies on scripture while learning to "pray God's word." The focus is how to live free of the strongholds that keep us back from a full and enriching relationship with Christ. Caroline Duffy has a group that meets on Sunday afternoon twice a month at the church. The group is mixed singles, marrieds, men and women. The group is full right now, but they are planning to "birth" another group shortly. St. Elizabeth's Chapter celebrates its 30th Anniversary in 2010 and continues with outreach as our emphasis. Our very first outreach project was the establishment of the Emergency Assistance Fund started by a handful of members. Today it has grown to include many volunteers from throughout the entire parish. The second longest ministry is to Ashton Woods Nursing Home where members assist clergy with a service of Holy Communion each and every Wednesday. Again, there are those outside St. Elizabeth's Guild who volunteer for this ministry. Four to five times a year, members prepare dinner for and serve 80 guests and members of Holy Comforter Parish. Our first meeting of the year is devoted to preparing hundreds of sandwiches for Emmaus House while we enjoy hearing their Director of Programs tell us about the work there. Each May, we sponsor a Senior Tea for members of several of our local senior citizens centers. Our guests are presented corsages and invited to participate in an array of home made goodies while the Director of Music for St. Martin's School provides a musical program by the kindergarten. We sponsor and assist

with several blood drives each year in conjunction with Life South. In December we gather at the home of a member for communion and brunch and to collect gift cards for Emmaus House's Christmas Party. Two devoted members host "Deck The Halls", a fundraiser with proceeds going to the Emergency Assistance Program. Members have voted the past two years to have bible/book study as their primary source of programs lead by one of our own. St. Elizabeth's meets the second Tuesday from September through May at 9:30 a.m. in the Parlor and we invite all who would like to become a part of our ministry to others.

### **St. Margaret's Chapter**

St. Margaret's focuses on the church nursery. This includes staffing the nursery each Sunday with two volunteers, monthly toy cleanings and providing snacks, toys, books, and other supplies. The chapter raises funds through various enterprises and events such as maintenance on the Coke machine between Gable and Pierce halls. The St. Margaret's chapter is involved in several inreach and outreach projects. Inreach projects include welcoming

baptized children into our parish with a parish cake after the service, providing meals for new mothers, actively working in the Sunday School program, and sponsoring the Annual Easter Egg Hunt. Outreach projects include monthly support of Holy Comforter Church and adopting a needy family during the holidays. Members meet in the Parlor the second Wednesday of each month at 9:30 a.m. where childcare is provided, as well as the 3rd Wednesday night of each month at various locations for a Girl's Night Out.

### **St. Martha's**

St. Martha's is the only ECW group to meet in the evenings. Our meeting time is the first Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. First, we have a program of about 30 minutes and then time to socialize and catch up.

Our two current projects are to organize greeters for the weekend church services, and to support the quarterly food drives to help stock the food pantry at Oglethorpe Presbyterian Church. We welcome anyone to come join us!

### **St. Mary Magdalene**

St. Mary Magdalene Chapter is a group of approximately 40 women whose ministry focus is local and foreign outreach. Through our annual fundraiser – a luncheon and card party – we supported Emmaus House, St. Martin's Emergency Assistance Program, the clergy's discretionary fund, a battered women's shelter, the Atlanta Union Mission and a number of other ministries. We also participated in a sewing project called "Rag Dolls to Love". These dolls join a larger project and are sent worldwide to children who have suffered a trauma (such as victims of war, those who have HIV/AIDS, or are in orphanages) and need a doll to cuddle and love. Our chapter meets the first Wednesday of every month at 10:30 a.m. in the church parlor. We celebrate with a

Christmas and end-of-the-year luncheon at a local restaurant. This year we made baby blankets for indigent families in north Georgia. We financially support several outreach projects through our Benefit Luncheon and Card Party held each year on the Thursday before Ash Wednesday. The 2010 event will be on Thursday, February 11.

We welcome new members interested in serving the community and the world.

### **St. Monica's**

St. Monica's chapter is a women's guild whose members have school age children. We support one another as our children grow and change, and we plan outreach opportunities in which our children can be involved. Our primary outreach ministry is providing Emergency Assistance Food Bags

for those who come to our church seeking help. Every 4 to 6 weeks the children help pack the snack bags that are then given to the people in need.

In addition to supporting the Emergency Assistance Program, our guild supports Interfaith Outreach Home by making dinners for the families there several times a year. We also adopt a kindergarten class at an area Atlanta school for the holidays. We have our annual Christmas Brunch and End of the Year Brunch held in a member's home, as well as many other fun programs scheduled at our meetings through the year.

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## **St. Martin's Boy Scout Troop 379**

Boy Scout Troop 379 was originally sponsored and organized by St. Martin's Episcopal Church and the St. Martin's Men's Club in 1960. The troop has a long standing tradition of being one of the best troops in Atlanta, consistently earning the coveted Quality Unit Award. Troop 379 currently has 35 members and has a very busy schedule. For example, in July they completed a 50 mile kayaking trip around Cumberland Island, and in June attended summer camp for a week in the north Georgia mountains earning merit badges and learning outdoor skills. Some of the monthly trips last year included hiking on the Appalachian Trail, shotgun and rifle shooting, map and compass competition, rock climbing, camping and fishing the Tennessee River, canoeing the Flint River, snow skiing in North Carolina, and water skiing on Lake Hartwell. Past years' high adventure trips have included bareboat sailing/snorkeling/fishing in the Bahamas, canoeing in Canada, kayaking and glacier climbing in Alaska, rafting the Grand Canyon, and hiking in the Rockies at Philmont Scout Reservation. This summer's high adventure trip will be to either Costa Rica, Glacier National Park, or backpacking in Europe.

In its proud history Troop 379 has produced over 100 Eagle Scouts - an honor achieved by less than 5% in the boy scout ranks. The Eagle rank usually requires 4-6 years of dilligent effort to earn 21 merit badges, 7 separate rank advancements, and planning, funding, and completion of a substantial work project that benefits the community. Some of the Eagle projects on the St. Martin's campus include customized racking and shelving in the basement, retaining walls along the parking lot bank, prayer gardens and walkways along the property perimeter, landscaping along Lanier Drive and Windsor Parkway, construction and installation of outdoor stairs, and landscaping along Ashford Dunwoody. Other Eagle projects off campus include construction of a bridge in High Point Park, construction and installation of outdoor stairs at Wieuca Baptist Church, and the construction and erection of 24 picnic tables at Chastain Park.

Troop meetings are every Monday evening from 7-8 in Gable Hall at St. Martin's Church. The troop takes trips and and goes on outings every month, spends a week in June at Woodruff Scout Camp in the north Georgia mountains, and usually has a high adventure trip in July.

Jim Reese, Joel Jeune, and Joel Brockmann represent St Martin's on the board. We are delighted to provide the following report on this involvement:

As the people of God we are called on to be hospitable to strangers in our midst, the AMIS ministry is directed toward being hospitable toward international students in metro Atlanta colleges and universities. Through hospitality and friendship, we reach the world. These students are the future political, economic, social, civic and religious leaders of their countries. Through AMIS, St. Martin's helps minister in the name of Christ to the 5,500 international students from 140 countries that are studying in the twenty metro Atlanta colleges and universities. Every Thanksgiving and Christmas we place over 300 international students who are unable to go home for the breaks with American families in Atlanta Homes to experience the traditions that make America. This is a great opportunity to not only share the hospitality of our patron, St. Martin, but to also teach foreign students about America.

Some of the AMIS activities that we have participated in this year include a bus tour of Atlanta places of interest for Atlanta-based students, an International Student Welcome Concert with the Atlanta Youth Orchestra, and another exciting and successful year of Christmas International House where international students from other universities around the U.S. come to Atlanta for Christmas. This ministry would not be possible without the support of churches and host families. St. Martin's has a lot to be proud of in our association with CIH and AMIS. We are touching the lives of the students and they are touching ours. There can be no greater sharing than Christian witness, and while this program can take us out of our comfort zone, it does teach us how to witness. ### St. Martin's Episcopal School

St. Martin's Episcopal School began its 50th Anniversary Celebration during the past year. Several special events have honored those who founded the school as well as recognized dedicated clergy, friends and former teachers of the school. Both Bishop Alexander and Bishop Whitmore have visited the church and school to celebrate fifty years of excellence in Episcopal education. With over 550 students and almost 100 faculty and staff, the school is thriving and is full of life from early morning to late evening with a full academic day and many special events. Thriving programs include core academics, drama, music, art, athletics, technology, Chapel services, service learning, and a growing media center/library. The school received its re-accreditation in the fall of 2009, along with many accolades, from the visiting committee from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and the Southern Association of Independent Schools.

### Dunwoody School for the Arts at St. Martin's

In April 2009, Melinda Mischik and I started discussing the possibility of bringing Dunwoody School for the Arts to St. Martin's. DSA has officially been in existence at Dunwoody Baptist since 1987 and I have been the director since 1993. We average around 300 students with Dance at DSA, Kindermusik and private music lessons, as well as strong summer performance camps.

We officially started DSA at St. Martin's in the fall of 2009. Currently we have an Our Time Kindermusik class (ages 18 months - 3 ½), 2 piano students and 3 voice students. It's a start! Our short term goal by the fall of 2010 is to offer 5 Kindermusik classes, 5 Dance classes, a Voice/Drama class and private instruction in piano, voice and guitar. A personal goal of mine would be to expand our summer camps to St. Martin's.

DSA's mission is to offer a quality arts education in a Christian environment. The staff and parishioners at St. Martin's have been extremely supportive and the facility works well for the DSA programs. I look forward to many years of outreach and developing relationships with the families in the community surrounding St. Martin's.
