We don't need poetry to remind us of our mortality. There are signs all around in our present world. In the Gaza strip as war continues to rage between Israel and Hamas, in our own cities across America, voices cry out against the injustice of poverty, hunger, and violence. Yet there is something in Sandburg's stark description that remind us that the glittering treasures of this present age shall always pass away into scrap and rust. And unlike a Super Bowl winning quarterback our ultimate destination is not Disney World but Omaha.

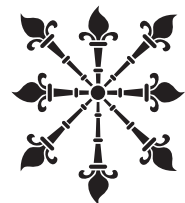
This raises key questions as we prepare to observe the forty-day season of Lent. Where are we going? What kind of train are we riding? What is our Lenten journey going to be like in the next forty days? There are I believe two temptations present in Lent. The first option is easiest. We can just ignore it and pretend it isn't there. Our secular world will give us lots of help on this one and aside from having steak on Friday we probably won't feel much of a tinge of guilt.



The second option though is more spiritually seductive. We can feel under intense pressure to change every single thing about ourselves in a brief

period of forty-days. We say to ourselves I am going to fast every Friday, read the Bible cover to cover, go on a monastic retreat, pray thirty extra minutes a day, work at a homeless shelter, and possibly even lose ten extra pounds. The overwhelming temptation to take on too much during Lent will doom this enterprise to failure as well as we try and out-Francis Saint Francis.

It is important for us to remember, though that Lent begins with ashes and ends triumphantly in the alleluias that mark the empty grave of Christ. What God requires from us on our Lenten journey is an earnest attempt to get to know him better. This may come from prayer, this may come from Scripture study, and this may even come from service to others. I believe, though, that it is not important *how much* we try to do during Lent, so much as *what* we do.

There is, after all, nothing we can offer to God that God does not already have. However God loved us enough to have sent his Son to die for our sins, and to offer us the possibility of a deeper and more satisfying relationship with our heavenly Father. This is what we should try and seek during the next forty days. If we are intentional about inviting God into our lives, we will find ourselves on a much different train. And unlike Sandburg's vision, our train will have an Easter destination that will always endure beyond the scrap, rust, and ashes of this present age.

Faith and Wholeness

It was in my young adult years when I began to understand that life is difficult. It took me until mid-life to realize that God understands this as well. In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus was baptized and the Holy Spirit descended upon him and a voice said, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." And then, "The Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness." It doesn't seem like Jesus got any break. From the waters of baptism he went right into the dark presence of Satan where he was tempted. But Jesus was not alone... "the angels waited on him."

There are a lot of people in this world who feel they don't get a break either. In hard times many of us are looking for relief of some sort. Life is difficult. We are faced with all kinds of hard decisions and temptations. The rough times can seem like they go on interminably. In biblical language 40 means just that...a long time. But we are not alone either. Even though we often feel like it, God has not left us alone. The God who created us and calls us "beloved" sons and daughters also sent to us the Son. It's the best news about our God...we have a God who understands that human life is difficult and didn't avoid it. He came and lived among us. Worked, suffered, and died as one of us. His life revealed to us all kinds of "good news" about God. When the Son returned to the Creator, God the Holy Spirit came and remains near. Because God is spirit, God is able to draw closer to us than we are to ourselves.

But we forget. When life is good and we are

comfortable, we don't spend much time discerning God's presence in our lives. I suppose that is human nature. When times are tough many either ask why would a God who is good allows bad times to happen OR we just "go away mad." God doesn't get a lot of favorable attention in either case. The good news is that God can handle our inattention, questions, anger, and even turning away.

40 days in the wilderness of Lent gives us time to examine our lives...to honestly address where we are in error and turn back. Lent is not a pleasant festive season. I can't say I really like the self-denial, introspection, and discipline that come with Lent. But I trust the process. And it has never failed me. God brings new life.

New life, however, is what happens on Easter. New life doesn't come without Good Friday. Jesus didn't avoid human pain and suffering. Neither let us avoid what is difficult and/or dark in our lives. Trust the process of Lent. Trust that you are not alone in difficult times of life. Trust God.

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism

When you arrive for church this weekend, you may notice that the baptismal font has returned to its previous place of honor near the entrance. There we hope it will become a symbol of our Christian life and not a place to set books and bulletins. We will be using the font for all of our baptisms in the coming months. (In most new church buildings

(like OLA) the baptismal font (or pool) is placed at the entrance of the church building.) This location is purposeful for it reminds the Christian community that our entry into a life in Christ begins with our baptism.

In Sure and Certain Hope: An Annual Lenten Series about Life, Death, and New Life

Lent is a time of year when it is especially appropriate to reflect upon our own mortality. This is not easy. It is actually the events of that first Easter that makes this possible, but even so, talking about our own death and dying and that of loved ones is difficult. And so with God's help I invite you to come to this class offering for three Sundays in Lent.

On **March 8**, we will first discuss the Christian framework that we have on which to build a theology of life, death, and new life. The focus will be on things spiritual and theological.

On **March 15**, we will view a film called *Critical Decisions*, which will lead us into a discussion about why people of all ages need to consider end of life issues. In other words, this class is not just for seniors. This second class will focus on things physical: Advance Directives and Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care will be the primary topics. (Legal forms provided for these purposes.)

On **March 22**, we will talk about gift giving. This final class will focus on things financial and address topics of wills, estate planning, and planned giving.

These three classes will be offered from 2 p.m. - 5 p.m.

While it is the third class that focuses on gift giving, I want to assure you that good planning for physical and spiritual needs at end of life is about gift giving as well. If you have had the good fortune to experience someone who died well, then you understand what I am talking about. If not, then I invite you to come to this class and explore these difficult issues in the comfort and safety of Christian community. You and your loved ones will be better prepared to face with love and courage that inevitable time in all of our lives.

Water Walking with ChristCare

At the end of the day, after feeding the five thousand, Jesus sent his disciples ahead of him in a boat to the other side of the sea. During the night, a storm raged and battered the disciples' boat. Huddled together on the boat, the disciples observed what they thought was a ghost walking past them on water. As their temperament grew from frightened to terrified and they cried out in their fear, one disciple - Peter - called to the ghost and said "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." Jesus answered "come," and we know the rest of the story - Peter walked on water, but saw the wind and began to doubt and, as result sank, until Jesus held out his hand to save him.

I do not know about you, but because of my very lawyer-like and conservative nature, I am pretty sure I would have been securely hunkered down in the middle of the boat with all the disciples other than Peter. And at the end of the journey, I would have been safe; but I would have missed out on the adventure and exhilaration of a million lifetimes - walking on the water.

In our ChristCare group, we are exploring how to get out of the boat and walk on water in our daily lives through a study of John Ortberg's *If You Want to Walk on Water, You've Got to Get Out of the Boat*. Ortberg teaches us, among other things, that many of us have our own personal boat in which we securely hide our God-given talents from the world, we must find the courage to get out of our boat, we need wisdom to discern when it actually is God calling us to get out of our boat, we must remain courageous and resilient when we see and experience the wind and begin to sink like Peter, and if we will get out of the boat and walk on water each day, we will expand our spiritual comfort zone and feel the exhilaration that accompanies spiritual growth.

In the Book of Common Prayer (page 298), it states that Holy Baptism is full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into Christ's Body the Church. The bond which God establishes in Baptism is indissoluble. The prayer book also recommends that Holy Baptism is appropriately administered within the Eucharist as the chief service on a Sunday.

For Episcopalians who remember the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, this was a dramatic change. It represented a conscious move away from the practice of private baptism and a recovery of an earlier church tradition that emphasized the centrality of Holy Baptism in the life our community. Also, by putting our font in a permanent location and using it regularly we are able to reinforce our understanding that through Holy Baptism we are all marked as Christ's own forever.

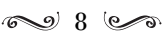
